Selections from the works of Herbert, Foster, Balfe, Sullivan, Offenbach, and Saint-Saens are woven throughout the performance, all together giving respite from the day and transporting you back to a cozy Victorian evening.

Mezzo-soprano Leslie Middlebrook and actor-narrator Lee Moore are accompanied on the piano by celebrated composer and pianist Richard Pearson Thomas. ### Leslie Middlebrook

Mezzo-soprano Leslie Middlebrook has been winning recognition and acclaim throughout the United States and Europe from critics and audiences alike. She appeared at The Bach to Bartok International Music Festival in Imola, Italy where she made her recital debut at the historic Palazzo Tozzoni, and was alto soloist in Rossini's Stabat Mater and Verdi's Requiem. Her European opera debut was in Bremen, Germany in the title roles on a double bill of Menotti's The Medium and The Old Maid and the Thief. She also performed in Austria with Vienna Kammeroper. In the U.S., she has sung with the Virginia, Berkshire, Des Moines, NJ Verismo, and Harrisburg Operas among others, in roles ranging from Orlofsky in Die Fledermaus and Amneris in Aida to La Principessa in Suor Angelica and Katisha in The Mikado. Ms. Middlebrook's frequent concert and oratorio engagements include her Carnegie Hall debut as alto soloist in the U.S. premiere of Sir Eugene Goosen's re-orchestration of The Messiah with the New England Symphonic Ensemble, alto soloist in Pergolesi's Stabat Mater with the St. Thomas More Chamber Orchestra, Harvey Burgett conducting, and Rossini's Petite Messe Solonelle with the Brooklyn Philharmonia. She sang the world premiere of Margarita Zelenaia's Mother's Lamentations for Mezzo-Soprano and Strings with One World Symphony which was also broadcast on international satellite television. In recent seasons, Ms. Middlebrook has emerged as a Wagnerian mezzo, having performed all the major mezzo roles in The Ring Cycle, as well as other operas with the Wagner Festival Orchestra of New York, David Gilbert, conductor.

Highlights of the past few seasons feature roles with One World Symphony, VPR Opera, and Opera Company of Brooklyn, ranging from Herodias in *Salome* and Mrs. Sedley in *Peter Grimes* to Frugola in *Il Tabarro*. Ms. Middlebrook also appeared as Mrs. Noah in Britten's *Noyes Fludde* with the Church of Transfiguration Orchestra. Other recent engagements include performances at the Ondine Festival in Bulgaria (Sofia and Rusalka), the Buxton Festival in England, and the world premiere of Luis Andrei Cobo's song cycle for mezzo-soprano, *History*, presented by Golden Fleece Ltd. Recent concert roles include Laura in *La Gioconda*, Bradamonte in *Alcina*, and Cornelia in *Giulio Cesare*. Ms. Middlebrook has also performed with both La Serenata and Light Opera of New York for the past five seasons at venues such as Symphony Space, Liederkranz, and The Players. She sings annually at the Metropolitan Museum Concert Series.

An accomplished actress known for her comedic talents, Ms. Middlebrook's musical theater credits range from a revival of Noel Coward's Bittersweet at the Massachusetts International Festival of the Arts to Madame Pavlenko (Margaret Dumont) in A Day in Hollywood/A Night in the Ukraine at the Pioneer Theatre in Salt Lake City. She has appeared as Mrs. Cratchit in A Christmas Carol with New England Lyric Operetta at the Rich Forum in Stamford, CT (Neal Goren conducting) and the Duchess of Plaza Toro in The Gondoliers at John Jay Theater (F. Paul Driscoll directing). Ms. Middlebrook was also alto soloist in the Best of Gilbert & Sullivan with Skitch Henderson's NY Pops Orchestra at Carnegie Hall and portrayed the Duchess and the Keeper of Knowledge in the world premiere of a new musical based on H.G. Wells' The Time Machine by Carlos Gorbea. She can be heard as the Dowager Empress Marie and Lenin's Wife on the CD of the new musical theater piece Faberge and appears as Helga on the DVD of The Magic Fruit by Barbara Stewart. Ms. Middlebrook recently played the Countess in Victor Herbert's The Red Mill with Light Opera of New York during the centennial celebration for Herbert.

A native of New York City, Leslie Middlebrook received her Master of Music in Opera from Manhattan School of Music.

### Lee Moore

Lee Moore is an acclaimed New York City-based theater, film, and television actor. Mr. Moore's theater credentials include performances at several Off-Broadway theaters in New York, including the Mint Theater, where he has appeared as General Bonsor in *The Charity that Began at Home*, Rutledge in *Welcome to Our City*, John in *Alison's House*, and Sir John in *The Return of the Prodigal*, and the Quaigh Theater, where he played Baron Scarpia in *Before Dawn*, Moxley in *Blessed Event*, and Kenneth Blake in *Christopher Blake*.

Mr. Moore has also appeared in regional theaters throughout the U.S. His roles include Poole in the Cleveland Playhouse production of *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* and Rumsey in the world premier of *City of Light* at the Buffalo-Arena Theater. He also sang the role of Sir John in *Me and My Girl* at Fullerton Light Opera in California, appeared as Lord Kitchener in the U.S. premiere of *Breaker Morant* in Los Angeles, played Dr. Alfred Morris in the Arizona Theater Company production of *Permanent Collection*, and Klinglehoff in Rochester's Geva Theater production of Steve Martin's *Underpants*. Recently, he appeared as Joshua Pennyfeather in Victor Herbert's *Red Mill* with Light Opera of New York.

Mr. Moore played Glenn Taggart for seven years on the CBS daytime drama Guiding Light and has performed in a wide variety of roles on all of the daytime serials. He also played Mr. Bing alongside Kelly Ripa in the television series Hope and Faith and was featured in War and Remembrance, Ohara, and The Law and Harry McGraw. Mr. Moore costarred in Meet the Muncys, Columbus Circle, and in the Italian mini-series The Lion of the Desert, with Omar Sharif and Elliott Gould. Mr. Moore's film roles include Reginald in Jim Carrey's Mister Popper's Penguins, Father O'Malley in Christ in the City (Toronto Film Festival award winner), John Brown in An American Story (NY Film Festival award winner), and Winter Garden in The Cutting Room Floor.

Born in Brooklyn, NY, Mr. Moore resides with his wife Leslie Middlebook in Manhattan and Cornwall, CT. He is a member of both The Players and The Lambs Club.

### Richard Pearson Thomas

Richard Pearson Thomas, composer and pianist, has had works performed by the Boston Pops, Covent Garden Festival, Houston Grand Opera, Chautauqua Opera, Eugene O'Neill Theater Center, Banff Centre, Skylight Opera Theatre, and Riverside Philharmonic Orchestra and Choir. His songs have been sung in Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, Wigmore Hall, Joe's Pub, and before the U.S. Congress. He is a recipient of an American Composers' Forum Continental Harmony commission for the Alabama Tri-State Orchestra. His work Race for the Sky, which was commissioned as a commemoration of the events of 9/11, has been performed by the Westchester Philharmonic Orchestra and in recitals nationwide.

Mr. Thomas' musical Parallel Lives was produced Off-Off Broadway by the Riverside Opera Ensemble, as was Ladies in a Maze, produced by Encompass Music Theatre. His musical Golden Gate is winner of the Michael Stewart Foundation Award and was presented in concert version by the Monmouth County Civic Chorus in New Jersey. His original music for In Thinking of America: Songs of the Civil War has been heard in more than 140 cities.

Mr. Thomas is currently on faculty at Teachers College/Columbia University. He has also taught at Yale and the University of Central Florida. Mr. Thomas is composer-in-residence of the Gold Opera Project, Young Audiences/New York. In that capacity, he has composed more than 85 operas with students in New York City public schools. His work with children was featured on CBS's *The Early Show* and singled out for praise by President Clinton when Young Audiences/New York was awarded the National Medal of Arts. Additionally, Mr. Thomas has concertized with singers worldwide.

He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and the University of Southern California, and is a native of Montana.



Mezzo-Soprano Leslie Middlebrook, also known as an accomplished actress with comedic talent, has been winning recognition and acclaim throughout the United States and Europe from both critics and audiences. She has over 40 roles in her repertoire, including Dorabella in Cosi Fan Tutte, Orlofsky in Die Fledermaus, Ciglietta in Mascagni's Isabeau, Maddalena in Rigoletto, Amneris in Aida and Katisha in The Mikado.

She has performed with the San Francisco Opera, the Virginia Opera, Des Moines Metro Opera, Berkshire Opera, and the Colorado Gilbert and Sullivan Festival, to name a few.

Ms. Middlebrook made her Carnegie Hall debut as alto soloist in the American premiere of Sir Eugene Gooseen's re-orchestration of The Messiah with the New England Symphonic Ensemble. Actor Lee Moore has made many contributions to film (2003 releases include Sin of the Father and Ghost Houses, where he plays the lead) and many roles on television.

Pianist and composer Richard Pearson Thomas has had worksperformed by the Boston Pops; Covent Garden Festival, Houston Grand Opera Chautauqua Opera, Eugene O'Neill Theatre Center, Banff Center and the Skylight Opera Theatre.

His songs have been sung in Alice Tully Hall, before the U.S. Congress and throughout Europe. He has performed concerts with singers worldwide, and has served as coach/director for the Aspen Music Festival and the Yale School of Music. He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and is a native of Montana.

With a dialogue written by Lee Moore, this evening features evocative songs, arias, and poetry, with some rarely heard but memorable melodies, such as "After The Ball," "A Bird in a Gilded Cage," and "Dolly Gray," and with selections from the works of Herbert, Foster Balfe, Sullivan, and Saint-Saens, as well as some poems of Keats, Browning and Shakespeare.
